Updated mandatory mask signage

We have updated Horizon mask signage in accordance to new direction that was shared in <u>Bulletin #76c – COVID-19 – HR</u> <u>Update – Oct 13 2020</u>.

Unless an employee or physician is alone in an office, masks must be worn at all times, regardless of whether two metres of physical distancing can be maintained.

Note: This is a change to practice where previously employees and physicians could have removed their masks if two metres of physical distancing could be maintained.

Public Health reported three new cases in Zone 5 (Campbellton region) today.

On October 18, Public Health reported three new cases in Zone 5 and two in Zone 1 (Moncton region). New Brunswick recorded its third death related to the COVID-19 in the Zone 1.

Public Health identified a positive case in a traveller who may have been infectious on Oct. 8 while on flight Air Canada Flight 8954 – from Toronto to Fredericton.

Individuals who travelled on this flight should self-monitor for symptoms for 14 days after the flight.
